CREW AND PICKUP TRUCK SAFETY AND OPERATION

TRUCK, YEAH!

Crew trucks and pickups are an important tool in our fleet. We rely on them to transport employee-owners, materials, and equipment.

Here are some basic work rules to consider when using crew trucks and pickups:

- Anyone operating a Company vehicle must have a current valid driver's license and be trained on the Company motor vehicle accident reporting procedures.
- Inspect your vehicle before use to make sure that lights, horns, signals, brakes, etc. are in operating condition.
- Always check the surroundings before moving your truck.
- Stunt driving and horseplay shall not be permitted.
- Secure your load. Even if it cannot fall out of the bed, it can roll
 around and damage or bounce out. In addition, if you stop too
 fast it will come through the cab.
- Use of seat belts is mandatory.
- Do not overload with employee-owners. Everybody will have a seatbelt. No one will ride in the bed of the truck or the trailer.
- Do not overload the truck with equipment or materials. Stay within the load ratings.
- When pulling a trailer, consider the legal load rating and center the load over the trailer's axles.
- Bind down the load. Do not travel with an unsecured load, even if you are not traveling on a public roadway. If loaded with equipment, clean the tracks or frame of loose soil and rocks that can fall off and damage a vehicle.
- Trailers will be properly attached to the truck with safety chains. Trailer lights will be attached and in working order. If the trailer has a braking system this should be attached as well.
- Park a minimum of 200 feet from any work operation. Do not park vehicles directly behind equipment.
- Operators of company trucks/vehicles shall know the limitations of their license type and shall not operate a vehicle or vehicle / trailer combination that requires a license type they do not possess.
